money, getting an allowance for souvenirs so they can budget and figure out what they can afford.

Every educator we interviewed agreed that older students should definitely keep a travel journal. And because state standards (fourth grade) include ecosystems as well as geological phenomena that form landscapes, parents should be sure to include discussions of natural wonders, from the Grand Canyon to the smallest details of the color of dirt at the side of the road.

Middle school and high school students have endless opportunities to learn from travel. Have them use the Internet to find the best airfares, hotel reviews and itineraries for museums and attractions. Have them document the vacation with video, or create a website or blog of the trip. If you are planning to vacation in a new country, have them practice their foreign language skills. Or, if they are interested in journalism, have them write a travel story and then try to get it published. GOING TO THE GROCERY STORE AND MAKING A FAMILY MEAL

The youngest children, preschoolers and kindergartners, can help spot grocery items and even count change at the checkout stand. "Kindergartners can use their kindergarten spelling to make lists," said teacher Edie Archibald of Harbor View Elementary School in Corona del Mar. "Then they can find the items on the shelves."
